It is truly a wonderful thing to guide young minds and hearts into the things of the Lord that will last not only for this lifetime but also for eternity. Our church just had their closing program that was open to all where we saw a snapshot of what took place all week at VBS.

The writer of Proverbs reminds us to “train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it.” Prov. 22:6

The things we learn as a child at church as well as at home make a lasting impact on us. Yes, some children as they grow up throw off the teachings as not relevant or for them now that they are free to make up their own minds about what they believe. Prov. 15:19 - *The way of the lazy man is like a hedge of thorns, but the way of the upright is a highway.*
